MUCK CROPS SHOW VEGETABLE DEMONSTRATION CONTEST

- NORTH JUDSON -HIGH SCHOOL AUDITORIUM

9:00 A.M.-Thursday, October 5, 1944

RULES

- 1. Entries will be limited to teams of one or two boys or girls, who are at least twelve and not over twenty-one years of age.
- 2. A demonstration may be on any topic related to the production, consumption and marketing of vegetables. The following list of topics is merely suggestive: - Seed treatment for control of diseases or insects-Treating and cutting seed potatoes-Germination tests of seeds-Construction and preparing hotbeds or cold-frames-Soil fumigation-Sowing seeds in flats, beds or field-Transplanting in beds or fields-Mixing of fertilizers-Applying fertilizers in field-Cultivation-Irrigation-Spray pest control-Systems of succession cropping-Variety types-Preparing vegetables for market, such as harvesting, washing, waxing, grading, packing, precooling, etc.-Packages used to market vegetables -Roadside markets-Fitting vegetables for exhibits, cooking vegetables, preparing vegetables for table, etc.
- 3. Each team must furnish its own demonstration materials.
- 4. Each team will be limited to fifteen minutes actual demonstrating time with three minutes more for questions from the audience. There will be no penalty for completing a demonstration in less than fifteen minutes. If materials have to be prepared just before the time of the demonstration, this can be done while the preceding team is demonstrating.
- 5. The teams will be judged according to these items:
 - a. Suitability of demonstration for the occasion.
 - b. Accurate and adequate information.
 - c. Speech-clear and effective.
 - d. Attitude pleasant and friendly.
 - e. Ability to answer questions from audience at end of demonstration. f. Time utilized. Penalty for excess.
- 6. Awards: The winning team and coach will receive \$50.00 to defray expenses to the national vegetable demonstration contest at Rochester. N. Y., December 8-9. This award is provided by the Indiana Farm Bureau Co-Operative Association.

MUCK CROPS GRADING AND VARIETY IDENTIFICATION CONTEST

OPEN TO VOCATIONAL AGRICULTURE STUDENTS AND 4-H CLUB MEMBERS

Separate contests will be held at the following points on the dates indicated in connection with the Purdue University Muck Extension Meetings.

Teams may compete at any one of the points listed:

Albion-October 3, 1944

North Judson-Thursday, October 5, 1944

PREMIUMS

The Baltimore & Ohio Railroad will award the first place team at each of the two points a cash payment of \$50.00 to be used in paying a portion of the expenses of the three team members and coach to the National Junior Vegetable Growers' Association meeting and judging contest at Rochester, New York, on December 8 and 9. No cash award will be made unless the winning team makes this trip. The rotating trophy will be presented to the high scoring team in the complete contest.

CONTEST RULES

I. Entries will be limited to teams of three members who are enrolled in High School Departments of Vocational Agriculture, or 4-H Clubs in the following counties: Lake, Porter, St. Joseph, Elkhart, Steuben, Noble, DeKalb, Kosciusko, Marshall, Starke, Jasper, Pulaski, Fulton, Whitley, LaPorte, Adams, Allen and LaGrange. Four members may compete with the three with the highest scores comprising the official team which will go to Rochester, New York.

Judging will start at 9 a.m.

II. VARIETY IDENTIFICATION

Fifty specimens of the following varieties will be identified by each team member.

- (a) POTATOES—Irish Cobbler, White Rural, Russet Rural, Katahdin (or Chippewa), Bliss Triumph.
- (b) ONIONS—Southport Yellow Globe, Southport Red Globe, Southport White Globe, Danvers Yellow Globe, and Sweet Spanish.
- (c) CARROTS-Chantenay, Nantes, and Danvers Half Long.
- (d) CABBAGE—Danish Ballhead, Wisconsin Hollander, Flat Dutch and Rock Red.
- (e) BEETS-Crosby's Egyptian, Detroit Dark Red.
- (f) CELERY-Giant Pascal, Golden Self Blanching.

III. GRADE IDENTIFICATION

Each team member shall grade fifteen potatoes, fifteen onions, ten carrots, and ten heads of cabbage on the basis of either U. S. No. 1 of Culls, naming the defect which causes the particular sample to be classed as "Cull".

IV. POTATO GRADING

Each contestant shall grade a 100 specimen sample of potatoes, dividing the tubers into two lots, those meeting the U. S. Grade No. 1 and those not meeting it. Contestants shall be scored as follows: Six points shall be deducted for every cull left in the U. S. No. 1's, and three points for every U. S. No. 1 left in the culls, and ten points for every minute of time used by the contestant.

V. SCORE

Individuals may score as much as 100 points on variety identification, 100 points on grade identification, and 100 points on potato grading. Thus, the perfect individual score would be 300. The score of each team will be the sum of the three highest individual scores of the members and alternate of the team.


